The Crosier has a significant role in the history of Bishop David High School and the recipient must be a graduating student whose persistence, dedication and perseverance reflect the motto of Bishop David High School, "Let Nothing Stop the Sons of David".

Marco grew up in Maturin, Venezuela, the sixth most dangerous city in the world. Marco and his family were originally from Cuba and went to Venezuela on a mission, with his father, as a doctor. After the family was robbed and with the continued threat of violence the family moved to the United States and settled in Louisville, Kentucky, Marco and his family knew very little English, and Marco had extreme challenges with the American curriculum. Marco went to Middle School at St. Rita and after graduating from St. Rita went to Holy Cross High School because his mother and father wanted him to attend a Co educational Catholic High School. As Marco said, "in Holy Cross I found a community of students dedicated to helping each other and a fantastic faculty and staff that dream at night of nothing else than to make dreams come true". Marco is an honor student and a member of the National Honor Society and is active in his school through Cougars for Christ, Student Council and the Diversity Committee, Baseball, Chess, Math Team, and Theater.

Active in the broader community Marco, in conjunction with the Frazier Museum, increased voting among minorities in Louisville and fighting for Environmental Justice with the Earth Spirit Center by giving out hundreds of plants. To help his family with tuition Marco worked at Panera Bread and completed his internship working at Mortenson Dental. Marco will be attending Bellarmine University and plans to major in Chemistry with a minor in Theology and Philosophy.

The Bishop David Alumni are extremely proud to be able to provide Marco the First Crosier Award and the \$1000 that accompanied this significant achievement.

After graduating from Bishop David in 1975, Kevin went to the University of Louisville where he played baseball and earned his degree in Justice Administration in 1980. Kevin is a member of the UL Athletic Hall of Fame.

For more than 20 years, Malone enjoyed a pro baseball career that saw him go from playing to the front office. In 1985, Kevin began work as a scout with the Angels. In 1987, he moved to Montreal, and in 1994 he was named the GM of the Expos. That year, he led Montreal to the best record in baseball (74-40) in a strike-shortened season and in 1995 Kevin was named "The Best General Manager in the Game". In 1998 he became the GM for the LA Dodgers and in 2001 retired from baseball after an illustrious 17 year career in which his teams earned a World Series and several trips to the postseason.

Kevin and his wife Marilyn relocated to Las Vegas from L.A. in February 2018 to fight sex slavery. They have two children, Shannon and Shawn.

Kevin is actively involved in numerous ministries and charitable organizations and is currently the CEO and Chairman of the Board of the United States Institute Against Human Trafficking. Kevin was an Executive Producer on two films and also helped create the "Shawn Miracle" (www.shawnmiracle.com) a film about his son's miraculous healing from a traumatic brain injury.

Bishop David Coat of Arms

The Bishop David Coat of Arms is rich with meaning: The Cross and Anchors, in the upper left quarter, are taken from the Coat of Arms of the Holy Cross Brothers who administer Bishop David High School.

In the right quarter, the Mitre, the Crozier, and the cross are symbolic of the patron of the school, Bishop John B. David, the co adjutor and successor to Bishop Flaget. In the lower left quadrant, the three fleurs-de-lys comes from the official flag of the City of Louisville, Kentucky. The three torches, in the lower right quarter, from the Coat of Arms of the former Archbishop of Louisville, The Most Reverend John A. Floersh, the prelate in whose See City the High School is located. These torches have an additional significance as the age-old symbol of an institution of learning representing wisdom, knowledge, and truth.

Bishop David High School Namesake

John Baptist Mary David, S.S. (French: Jean- joined the Society of Saint-Baptiste-Marie In 1810 he moved west to

David), (June 4, 1761 - July 12, 1841) was a French born prelate of the Roman Catholic Church in the United States. He served as bishop of the Diocese of Bardstown in Kentucky from 1832-33.

David was born in Couëron, in the Province of Brittany (now the Department of Loire-Atlantique) in pre-revolutionary France. At age 7 he was placed under the care of his uncle, a priest, who instructed the boy in Latin, French, and music.

He entered the nearby college of the Oratorians at age 14, and later the seminary appointed Coadjutor of the Diocese of Nantes, receiving the tonsure in 1778. Ordained a priest on and Scripture at the Sulpician seminary in Angers from 1786

until 1790, when the French Revolution forced him to seek shelter in the private home of a Catholic family.

In January 1792, seeking safety, David was part of a small group of Sulpicians who left France for the United States. under the leadership of the Abbé Benedict Joseph Flaget, S.S., landing in Baltimore, Maryland in March. He was first sent by Bp. John Carroll to serve the Catholics of southern

September 24, 1785, he Sulpice (commonly known as the Sulpicians) and taught philosophy, theology, serve under his colleague, Flaget, now the bishop of the Diocese of Bardstown, Kentucky, where he established St. Thomas Seminary. In 1812 he founded the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth, whose Superior General he remained almost to the end of his life.

On July 4, 1817, David was



Bishop of Bardstown and Titular Maryland in Bryantown and missions in Charles County. While professor of philosophy at Georgetown College (1804-06), he continued to serve as a missionary to southern Maryland. He was the professor of theology at St. Mary's Seminary (1806-10) in Baltimore, where he was also acting president during 1810-11.

Bishop of Maurocastrum by Pope Pius VII. He received his episcopal consecration on August 15, 1819 (the two year-long delay due to his reluctance to accept his nomination) from Bishop Flaget. Following his consecration, he continued to serve as a missionary, superior of St. Thomas' Seminary, and pastor of St. Joseph's Cathedral. David succeeded Flaget as

the second Bishop of Bardstown on August 25, 1832. However, he resigned as Bishop less than a year later, on March 17, 1833. His poor health compelled him to retire to the motherhouse of the Sisters of Charity he had founded in Nazareth, where he later died at age 80 and was buried.

FALCON FLASHBACKS Football 1960-63

As I remember, football tryouts for our first freshman team started August 1960. We only had 113 freshmen in the school and I don't remember how many showed up. Most players came from St. Helen, St. Lawrence and St. Paul and several players from other schools in the area who had never played in grade school. It was a rough start. The school was not finished and we had no gym, no locker rooms, no cafeteria, and really, no field. We used a grassy area next to the gravel parking lot and used the stairwells to put on our gear. Wally English was the head coach, offensive coach, defensive coach, quarterback coach, end coach and every other coach. Fr. Bill Bohnert was the assistant coach for all of the above. That was it!! I don't remember how many games we had, but it seems like we played PRP, Butler, Valley, KMI, St. Joe's Bardstown and, I think, Flaget. We were respectable.

Our second year we had our first JV team. I'm not sure if we had a separate freshman team. Again, we were respectable and competitive. Our junior year, our first varsity year, we added several coaches and probably had a full staff, but English still ran everything. We had to play against seniors that year and still did OK. Besides out-of town teams, our biggest win was against Durrett, a well-established public school at the time. Our biggest game was the last game of the season, DeSales. We were a tremendous underdog. English, who was way ahead of his time, had a plan. We had secret practices at Shively Park to practice a never-heard-of, "Shot Gun Spread Formation" offense, never before seen in Louisville!! DeSales, as expected, was winning 21-0 at half time. Then we sprang the new offensive. I wish I could say we won, but we did come back with 21 points. We lost 28-21 I think.

We never had a field house but we had isometric bars on our new "field" and used donated weights in a barn behind Jiffy's bar. In 1963, our senior season, we played OK, but when you played us, you knew you wee in a game! Everyone knew Bishop David could play and they hit hard. In December 1963, Wally English went to look for another job and was fired (as I remember it). Denny Nash came in then. His first team was the 1964 year. ~Bob Walsh '64

Catfish McGuire was our defensive coach as sophomores. He became the first head coach at Moore High School. John Longmeyer came our junior year as the inside linebacker coach. The isometric bars came the summer before our senior season. Bruce ran into one and cut his eye open. As juniors we lost to DeSales 33-21. We played a 5-4 defense all season until that week, then we switched to a 5-3 because DeSales ran a double wing offense, to wingbacks on the same side shoulder to shoulder and then ran their 220 FB, Ron Smith, behind them. And in the win over Durrett, before Bob Walsh scored the last TD with the interception, we stopped them on a 4th & 6". That was the game I had 22 tackles (so Wayne Milam told me). Wayne did the stats for the school newspaper. ~Tony Leo '64

summer before our sophomore year, the area where the field is now, was a bit of a swamp. Wally got some free loads of dirt to fill it in. Joe Doyle, who built the subdivision where we lived behind Zayres, lent us a small dozer. Fr. Bohnert and I mastered the grading task and smoothed it out. Then Bohnert got the dimensions of the Flaget track. We dug out the circular track. Next, Ed King, Sr., who worked at American Standard, was very happy to donate scrap waste as it was a task to get rid of it. I don't think it was environmentally friendly and you best not fall on it.

Not part of football, but Fr. Ted Sans was one of the 4 original teachers we had: Swartz, Sans, Bohnert, and Wally. Swarts and Bohnert made their living quarters in two classrooms and showered in what became the maintenance closet. The strongest memory I have of football, was being moved from 3rd string QB behind Dan Leasor and Mike Egan to 2nd string. It was the result of Dan Leasor getting one of the worst knee injuries I have ever seen. I still remember visiting him in the hospital. It still did not allow enough quarters of play to get me a letter, but I loved being part of the team! I am thankful nobody has offered up the cheerleading story my freshman year! ~Eddie King '64
